



Happy Christmas 1999 and Peaceful New Year 2000 to All

Parish Council Meetings

The Parish Council meets once a month. Main points that have arisen in recent meetings of the Council:

Best Kept Village Competition

Last year's position 3^{rd} out of 10 – this year 2^{nd} out of 10. The judges recorded that the churchyard, recreation field, war memorial, village sign, residential development, commercial premises, public buildings and facilities were all attractive. Overall tidiness was good. The children's play area was singled out as the best play area in the county and won a first place award. The judges did comment on the weight and speed of traffic and felt we should consider traffic calming. The Council resolved to refer these comments to the NCC Planning and Transportation.

Norfolk PACT Millennium Award Scheme

In February 1999, Norfolk PACT (Partners Against Crime Task Force) in partnership with the Millennium Commission and Norfolk Youth & Community Services launched the Millennium Award Scheme. This provides an opportunity for young people 16-24 to make a real difference in their local community. It encourages them to identify and tackle a local problem through challenging projects that will deliver significant benefits to the community. Individuals or groups of 3 who apply will receive up to £2000 to support their project for the parish. The closing date is 7th January 2000. You can obtain details from the Parish Council.

Mayor's Civic Awards for Voluntary Service

A person can be nominated who has either lived in the Borough of King's Lynn and West Norfolk for at least 2 years as at 1st Jan 1999 or provided work within the borough for that period. Closing date for nominations 18th January 2000.

Mayor's Millennium Project for Schools

The Mayor has invited all primary schools in W Norfolk to take part in a project whereby today's children can pass on their feelings about life today to children 100 years hence. All work will be kept and form part of a children's archive for historians of the future but some will be buried in a time capsule. The Mayor asks we encourage our local schools to take part.

Pedestrian Crossing – Lynn/Hunstanton Road

Concern has been raised about the dangers of crossing the road at Budgen's. NCC state that the 6-year accident record has revealed only 4 slight accidents which were non-pedestrian. The Council resolved to write to NCC requesting they consider a refuge in the centre of the road if a crossing was at present impossible.

Dersingham 1st and Nursery School

The Head Teacher has been asked by the governors to seek parish support and further action on ways to ease the parking problems in the Pell Road area in front of the school at the start and end of the school day. They suggested yellow lines would be appreciated to avoid cars obstructing this area. The governors urged the Parish Council to seek adoption by the NCC of the roads off Saxon Way which give access to the school and surgery. It was felt by the Parish Council that this would shift the problem to other roads – they resolved to write to the school suggesting that 'walking to school' and 'car sharing' were promoted instead and resolved to take no action in respect of the request for yellow lines and the adoption of the roads by NCC.

Millennium Tree Planting including Sensory Garden

The millennium project that topped the popularity poll in Dersingham 2000's original survey was 'Greening the Village', which aims to plant trees and carry out other environmental improvements. This project is now ready to go. Volunteers are needed to adopt trees, in particular taking responsibility to water them in dry weather until established. People are also being asked to sponsor specific trees as a way of commemorating a person or event – details will be recorded in a special Millennium Commemoration Book that will be kept for posterity.

Donations are needed towards the estimated cost of £3000 for building a Millenium Sensory Garden – the Borough Council have agreed that the garden can be sited in Orchard Close.

Footway for the Disabled

Problems have been experienced by wheelchair users with regard to footways being obstructed by overgrown hedges and brambles etc. if anyone does encounter difficulty please contact the Clerk of the Parish Council so that the matter can be dealt with.

Community Arts 2000

The main objective of this group is to bring arts events, workshops and exhibitions to villages. The villages being targeted at Snettisham, Dersingham, Ingoldisthorpe and West Newton. They have received a small amount of funding from Rural Arts East, Rural Community Council, Jarrolds and Education Extra. The Arts Education Officer is prepared to help fund willow weaving workshops in local schools. The group is approaching all Parish Councils in the communities involved to ask for financial support.

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What's On in Dersingham

Our Schools

Dersingham First and Nursery School

Love in a Shoebox – By now the children will have collected items to go in shoeboxes to children in Romania. The Rev Pam Bayliss gave a talk to the children to show them a very moving video about the appeal last year and the children were inspired to bring in items for shoeboxes. The boxes were handed over to the Rev Bayliss in November and distribution will be arranged. The school's main charitable activity is to support a small boy in India called Mohan – money is collected by various means such as Harvest Festival, Children in Need, the Carol Service collection and other fund raising activities to provide money for his education. A letter from Action Aid tells the children how Mohan is getting on and what he and his family are doing.

Willow Comes to Dersingham – the children planted live willow in the school grounds in November, creating a willow tunnel and also an arbour with a seat on the school field. The project is sponsored by Friends of the School and the work was carried out by NCC grounds teams. The willow will form a tunnel to provide a play area for the summer and valuable shelter when the weather gets warmer. The school hopes to sponsor trees in the 'Greening Dersingham' project and the area outside the school gates on Saxon Way will be used to plant some new trees within this millennium project.

Christmas 1999 – On Friday 10 December, the school will open from 6 pm so that parents and anyone else from the village could come and view the school and see the work the children had done in relation to Christmas. On Tuesday 14th December the Annual Carol Service will be held at St Nicholas Church. On Wednesday 15th December the children are to be treated to a Christmas entertainment by the Toll House Company.

Dersingham Friends of the School – They continually raise money for the school to provide additional items. They have many events – Jumble Sales, Quiz Nights, Open Fayres etc. They also run a 50 Club whereby a draw is made each month for £10, £5 and once a year there is an annual draw of £50, £20 and £10. Any member of the village is welcome to join by having a £1 share in the Club.

Dersingham Nursery Class – At the moment there are one or two vacancies in the nursery both in the morning and afternoon sessions. If you know of any child who is of nursery age, between the ages of 3 or 4, or if you have friends in other villages who would like to take up the opportunity of their child attending this nursery, they should contact the Head Teacher, Mr Ward, at the school on 540022 to obtain an application form.

Dersingham St George's (CE) Middle School

The school provides a broad and balanced education for children aged 8-12 years of age.

Friends Association – This is an active organisation which is open to non-parents to join. Mr Steven Rudd (543859) is the chairperson and can be contacted for information about forthcoming events.

Wild Geese over Dersingham



One of the really special sights and sounds of winter should be taking place at this time of year in the sky above Dersingham. This is the dawn and dusk flight of skeins of wild geese as they move to and from their roost site on The Wash. It is easy to become accustomed to this spectacle, which is a shame because we are very lucky to live in an area hosting an internationally important population of truly wild birds. I hope the following information will add to your enjoyment when watching the geese fly over your house.

The first thing to know is that they are (almost all) pink-footed geese Anser brachyrynchus. Fortunately, the colour of the feet is not the only way to identify them! Experienced birdwatchers can recognize the call, considered to be the most musical of all geese calls, and even their flight patterns in the sky. However, there are a number of similar 'grey' geese so playing the odds is the best way to name the birds you see in the familiar 'V formations over Dersingham. This is because the number of pink-footed geese found in this area in winter is so large that you are very unlikely to be wrong. The entire population of pink-feet breeding in Iceland and Greenland, estimated at 225, 000, winter in the UK. This population has expanded recently owing to increased nesting success in lowland Iceland. Last years peak count in North and West Norfolk was 76, 355 or about a third of the world population. The record count from the roost at the Snettisham RSPB reserve was 45, 925 and these are the birds seen flying inland over Dersingham at dawn and back at dusk. You may be interested to know that RSPB and English Nature wardens carry out a coordinated weekly count at the roost sites. We therefore have very accurate records stretching back over several years. The numbers are large but it is worth considering that they represent a significant part of the world population and we therefore have a special duty to ensure their survival during the cold winter months.

Pink-feet arrive during late September or early October in Scotland flying in their familiar 'V formations. This is an energy saving strategy. The lead bird will frequently change giving the entire flock a chance to shelter in the slipstream of the bird in front. Geese are also known to fly at great heights during their long migratory journeys, often in excess of 20,000 feet. The winter flocks are very mobile mixing, splitting, or moving on depending on the weather, food supply and disturbance. The geese we see in Norfolk have typically arrived via Grampian, Tayside, Lothian, Dumfries and Lancashire. They are looking for a reliable food supply and safe roost site.

The food is mainly found on farmland. When they first arrive they often try to feed on newly germinating split grain, but soon move onto the aftermath of the sugar beet harvest. They eat the small but energy rich piece of leftover beet and the leaves. The habit of feeding on sugar beet was first observed at Holkham in 1966 when the Snettisham roost held only 1,348 birds. The spread of this preference probably explains the dramatic rise in the local wintering population. The safe roost sites on The Wash, Scolt Head Island and Stiffkey salt marsh also greatly improve the survival chances of the geese. There is obviously some potential conflict between farmers and geese in this area and the local farming community should be congratulated for showing considerable tolerance towards the birds. This is particularly true of farm manager Edward Cross from Abbey Farm, Flitcham who has been recording the number of pink-feet feeding on the farm for many years. He also delays ploughing in the tops for as long as possible to ensure the birds have something to eat. The geese flying over Dersingham are often going to Flitcham. Towards the end of their stay with us in February and March the geese move onto the coastal grazing marshes to feed. The return flight to Iceland in the spring follows a very similar route to the autumn journey. I had a call last year from a man in Lancashire who enjoys watching the geese fly over his house from the east every spring. We are lucky indeed to be able to see this spectacle twice every day.

Please remember that pink-feet are wild birds and if you see them in the fields when driving along the lanes of West Norfolk this winter do not get out of your car to watch. The geese could fly off towards dangers such as guns or overhead electricity lines. We organise special goose events throughout the winter where we take visitors to see the geese leave the roost at dawn. Some of these events include a full English breakfast to warm you up and then a drive to see the birds feeding in the fields, if we can find them! 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Bonfire Party



It is planned to open the barn to the public from Easter to October at weekends and during the Flower Festival in July.

Dersingham 2000 Association

A recent 1940s dance in the village, *Jitterbug to Jazz*, raised £340 towards the cost of insurance and preparing the. Tithe Barn for access. The leader of the History Group, Mrs May Davey, said: "There has been an awful lot of red tape to cut through. We are confident everything will be ready for our Millennium Drop-in Centre and hope everyone in the village will come to see inside the barn – one of the most striking buildings in Dersingham".

A Dersingham Community Centre &

Established in the early 80s after the primary school moved to St Georges, the Centre has flourished ever since. The County Council developed it as a Youth & Community Centre. In 1998 the county announced it was to close all such centres – the Parish Council called a meeting to see if there was sufficient support locally to take over the running and management. A Management committee was set up charged with the role of keeping the Centre open and available to all sectors of the community. The Parish Council has become the new leaseholders with the Management Committee becoming a Charity Trust – total responsibility was finally transferred to the Trust on 1 August 1999.

The Centre consists of 5 rooms of varying sizes including a good-sized main hall. There are excellent kitchen facilities. A special feature is the coffee room with its own small kitchen attached. This can be used independently of the other rooms and is ideal for committee meetings etc. The Centre is in use every weekday (see list of regular users below). Charges are very reasonable given the high costs of running and maintaining such a building. As regular users are invited to have a representative on the Committee it is very much the users who fix the level of charges!
